Possible Changes With Aging

- Physical changes
 - Eyes & ears
 - Decline in strength & mobility
 - Forgetfulness
- Functional changes
 - More help with daily living activities
 - Falls risk
 - Nutrition risk

Red Flags: Physical Signs

- Physical signs
 - Recent accident, falls or close calls
 - Slow recovery or a chronic condition that is worsening
 - Changes in eating habits, noticeable weight loss or weight gain
 - Neglected personal hygiene, dirty clothes, body odor, bad breath, neglected nails and teeth, sores on their skin



Red Flags: Physical Signs

- Physical signs
 - Seeming more frail
 - Inappropriate behavior, making phone calls at all hours, unusually loud, quiet, agitated
 - Physical problems like injury marks or burns from falls, forgetfulness, abuse, alcohol or drug abuse





More Red Flags: Social Signs

- Social signs
 - Cutting back on activities and interests that were once important, such as clubs or attending religious services
 - Days spent without leaving the house
 - Changed relationships with friends and family, causing neighbors and friends to express concerns

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More Red Flags: Financial Signs

- Financial
 - Piles of mail in various places
 - Unopened personal mail & bills
 - Crisp unread magazines
 - Mishandled finances like losing money, paying bills twice, hiding money
 - Making unusual purchases



More Red Flags

- Kitchen signs
 - Stale or expired food
 - Broken appliances
 - Signs of fire
 - Multiples of the same item on the counter



And More Red Flags

- Home maintenance signs
 - Clutter
 - Things are dirty, grimy
 - Signs of neglect
 - Plants that are dying or dead
 - Pets that don't seem well tended
 - Newspapers in the bushes



Most Common Factors: Causing Placement in a Care Facility



- Inability to perform activities of daily living & other functions:
 - Bathing, dressing/undressing, eating, walking, transferring bed/chair, using the toilet, preparing meals, using the phone, managing money
- Cognitive decline
- Unsafe environment; falls

Most Common Factors: Causing Placement in a Care Facility



- Medication mismanagement
- Unmanaged health issues; declining health
- Mental health concerns
- Living alone; no support; incapable caregiver
